

# PONGO POETRY PROJECT

## Pongo Poetry Workshop Theme: Roots

**Length:** 60-90 Minutes

**Standards:** CCSS:ELA:W.3.D; WA-ELP:9-12.9

### Snapshot

**Essential Question** (*Why are we learning this?*): How does where we come from affect who we are?

**Learning Target** (*What are we doing?*): Students read 1-2 examples of personal poems; students write their own poem (s) on the theme or other personal topic.

**Success Criteria** (*How do I know I was successful?*): I wrote 1 to 2 personal poems on the topic of identity in relation to place or other personal topic; students use 3-4 poetic devices to personalize the poems.

**Opening Poem**—(2 minutes)

**Intro to Personal Poetry Writing with Pongo**—(5 min)

*Opening questions:* Who's written poetry before? What makes a good poem?

*Pongo Poetry Project's Values:*

- Honesty is the most quality of good poetry.
- Write from the heart about who you are as a person.
- Young people have important things to say.

*Lesson continues in either Pongo Classic or Classroom mode...*

<b>Pongo Classic</b> 1-1 ratio, ideal for after school or pull-out group <i>(approx. 5 students, 5 Pongo-trained Poetry Mentors)</i>	<b>Pongo Classroom</b> <i>(1-2 poetry mentors; 10-20 students)</i>
<b>Names &amp; Norms</b> —(5-10 min) <i>(What are some guidelines we should have to create a Brave Space?)</i>	<b>Names &amp; Norms</b> —(5-10 min) Same as “Classic”
<b>Group Writing Activity*</b> —(15-20 min)  1 <sup>st</sup> Read/Watch <a href="#">“Nikki Rosa” by Nikki Giovanni</a>  2 <sup>nd</sup> Group Poem in Response—Students volunteer responses to instructor prompts, instructor records responses, a poem is created.	<b>Group Writing Activity*</b> —(20 min)  Same as “Classic”
<b>*Skip Group Poem Activity if only 60 Minutes</b>	
<b>One-on-One Poetry Writing</b> with Students and Poetry Mentors*—(30-40 min)  Students-Mentors pair up Student chooses a.) Dictation, b.) Fill-in-the-blank such as <a href="#">“Where I’m From”</a> or other or c.) independent write, asking for assistance when needed. Multiple methods may be used depending on student need.	<b>Independent Writing*</b> —(20 min)  1.) Participants complete fill-in-the-blank such as <a href="#">“Where I Come From”</a> or can write independently. Pongo Poetry Mentor (s) circulate and is available to help generate ideas.
<b>*Pongo’s “Ideas for Personal/Poetic Enhancements” Handout available for poetic devices</b>	
<b>Group Sharing</b> —(10-15 min)  Review our Norms/Guidelines  Volunteer participants read (one to start, more if time), Audience listens; snaps at the end	<b>Group Sharing</b> —(10-15 min)  Same as “Classic”

**Wrap Up**—(5-15 min)

1. Students complete Writer Experience Survey/Writer’s Release for Publication
2. Pongo Poetry Mentors collect student poems
3. Send out poem *(if time)*: “Black Like Me” by Kiana Davis; or “Five Houses Down” by Christian Wiman
